I recall he was often ridiculed by some of the older Sergeants. He was sort of a 'red-neck' type; skinny with bright, orange hair, and glasses; he seemed to have a bit of a difficult time in the Infantry - but, he was always on time and basically ready.
Timothy K. Kadrie	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Faraj	Cannot recall particulars about this young man; however, I do remember the name. I'm almost positive I'll recognize him and be able to recall details, once I've seen his face and talked with him.
Jon M. Embry	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Faraj	Cannot recall this man; however, I may recognize him and be able to recall details, once I've seen his face and talked with him.
Andrew Tipton	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Workman	I do remember this NCO. He was a good Marine; trusted by his peers I believe.

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HM1 Andrew Slaughter	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Workman	Amongst the top-two Corpsman with whom I have ever served. A very fine young man; inquisitive, dedicated, and quite brave. I 'wrote-him-up' for the Bronze Star w/ "V" citing his brave response to a very large IED Strike; that Strike had occurred while we were traveling East to West on Rt Mobile, approximately one month[?] prior to the afternoon in question. BTW, he was awarded the Bronze Star (not sure about the 'V;' but, I think he got it) in front of the White House (CAMPEN), during the time I was hospitalized at Scripps, Encinitas. Ask me about this; and his attentiveness, when I was injured in 12/04.

1stSgt Sean W. Hyman	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Workman	One of the very finest Marines assigned to the JUMP CP. Sgt Hyman had been assigned to the platoon maybe three weeks[?] prior; a replacement for KIA/WIA Marines. He was my 'Trail LAV-25' VC - this position in the formation required the most trusted NCO. I remember being very confident in his abilities.
Jeremy D. Lollar	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Workman	Cannot recall particulars about this young man; however, I do remember the name. I'm almost positive I'll recognize him and be able to recall details, once I've seen his face and talked with him.
1stSgt David M. Beall	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Baehr	Fantastic platoon Sergeant. Very good communicator (0621); very detailed, knowledgeable, generally cheerful, and a pleasure to serve with. At no time, did I ever sense apprehension from him regarding his approaching the CG or myself about any circumstance/issue/problem, which had concerned him. He enjoyed solid trust from the CG.
Marco Jimenez	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Baehr	Jimenez was the last name of my Staff Sergeant (VC for the 'Lead LAV'), whom I had lost 3 - 5 weeks prior to the evening in question. I don't really recall another "Jimenez." I'm just not sure I remember him.
1stSgt Eric D. Cook	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Baehr	Cannot recall particulars about this man; however, I may recognize him and be able to recall details, once I've seen his face and talked with him.

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Sgt Richard C. Guillenavila	<i>Will testify in person.</i>	Baehr	Cannot recall particulars about this man; however, I may recognize him and be able to recall details, once I've seen his face and talked with him.
Ali G. Abdelgawad	<i>Will be at a business conference; but, will testify telephonically.</i>	Faraj	I liked this Marine; but, I did not entirely trust him. He is one of those Marines whom you get the sense about, that he'll always prioritize his own desires over the needs of others. Primarily he was a JUMP CP member for his linguistic skills; but, he wasn't very good with those dialects being spoken in Al Anbar; I can't fault him for that though - he did try quite hard. He wasn't the type of Marine whom is entirely comfortable in adverse environments/conditions. If it wasn't for his linguistic abilities, I doubt very much he would have been selected for the JUMP CP. He wasn't like the Infantrymen in the Platoon; but, he was generally okay.

I imagine it's one of the former Lt.'s who were garrisoned at 2/4's 'Combat Outpost' in eastern Ramadi; one of guys who is adamant regarding his blatant lies concerning whether he did or did not strongly advise me to travel the 'Race-Track' (the curvy road, North of Rt Michigan). In their statements, the former Lt's are quite particular about having told me NOT to go on that Road - that it was a Black Route. I remember our consultation on the hood of my HMMWV, within 'Combat Outpost' like it was last week; they <u>very</u> strongly advised me and recommended that I travel on the Race-Track, because "they use it all the time," and they thought it was a good route. To this day, I maintain no ill thoughts towards these guys; I think they gave me what they considered good advice, absolutely. The truth is, IEDs were a fact-of-life in 2004; if you drive the roads often enough, you're eventually going to hit them. From the Lt's seemingly synchronized statements to NCIS, it seems they have colluded to absolve themselves of any responsibility, concerning that IED-Strike. Well, I don't think they're responsible at all; the enemy was responsible. But, perhaps they feel that all this attention about a 6-year old event could spell trouble for them[?]. Also, realize that 2/4 sustained the most casualties of any Marine Infantry Battalion in 2004 (excluding the fighting in Fallujah II), while in the city of Ramadi. MSgt Paul Jones (currently assigned to IMHG, with myself) was the Motor-T Chief for 2/4 at Hurricane Point (western-Ramadi); he's also on my character witness list.

James M. Heredia	<i>Tried to make contact, phone doesn't receive incoming calls; an invitational letter has been mailed.</i>	Cannot recall particulars about this man; however, I may recognize him and be able to recall details, once I've seen his face and talked with him.
Carlos Duran	<i>No known working numbers; an invitational letter has been mailed.</i>	Sgt Duran was always assigned as my Driver (Vehicle #2; an UpArmored HMMWV equipped with two (2) general purpose laptops (Toughbooks) for (tactical) 'chat,' a dash-mounted Blue Force Tracker, and a VRC-89 Radio stack for VHF and UHF). Sgt Duran, over the course of 4 - 5 months, spent countless hours driving myself, as well as, any VIPs (usually Colonels from 1DIV Staff) around. He's a tad bit lazy; but, he can laugh at himself about it.
