Primarily he was a JUMP CP method for his linguistic skills; but, he wasn't very good with the dialects being spoken in Al Anbar; I can't fault him for that though - he did try quite hard. He wasn't the type of Marine whom is entirely comfortable in adverse environments/conditions. He wasn't like the Infantrymen in the Platoon; but, he was generally okay.
