

Summary of Action:

Staff Sergeant Dalzell was in receipt of Imminent Danger Pay during this period. The Combat Distinguishing Device is authorized.

For heroic achievement while serving as Company Communications Chief, Company B, 2d Tank Battalion, Regimental Combat Team 8, 2d Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force (Fwd) in support of operation IRAQ FREEDOM 04-06 from 13 March to 1 September 2005. Staff Sergeant Dalzell is enthusiastically recommended for the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with Combat Distinguishing Device for the following accomplishments:

He has established a streamlined system of accounting and maintaining approximately two million dollars worth of communications equipment during the entire period, ensuring 100% accountability of all communications equipment for 17 M1A1 Abrams main battle tanks, 2 M88A2 recovery vehicles, 1 Armored Vehicle Launched Bridge (AVLB), six high mobility multi-purposed wheeled vehicles (HMMWVs), two logistic vehicle systems (LVS), and three medium tactical vehicle replacements (MTVR). His efforts have guaranteed positive communications with all adjacent and higher units throughout the entire area of operations.

During the period of 13 March to 1 July Staff Sergeant Dalzell took it upon himself to acquire, master, and utilize the enhanced position location reporting system (EPLRS), M-DACT, and D-DACT systems for the Company's command, control, and communications needs. The successful implementation of the equipment streamlined communications with higher headquarters and adjacent units, thus allowing the Company Commander to make quicker and more accurate decisions during combat operations.

He played a significant role in ensuring a successful reconstitution of the communications assets of 16 M1A1 Abrams main battle tanks and one M88A2 Recovery Vehicle. This allowed increased operational effectiveness and success.

Besides efficiently executing the tasks of Company Communications Chief for an armored unit, he also fulfilled the role of Headquarters Platoon Sergeant. He was personally responsible for the welfare of the 40 Marines of the largest platoon in the Company in a combat environment. As a member of the Company's combat trains, he was also responsible for the effective tactical employment of these Marines, executing in excess of 25 tank recovery and maintenance contact missions in hostile areas throughout area of operation (AO) Raleigh and ten Company-level combat operations, consisting of 50 combat patrols, 75 cache sweeps, 50 mounted observation posts, 80 cordon and knocks, and 120 vehicle check points, a majority of which he personally led.

Staff Sergeant Dalzell was a member of the combat trains for Team Brawler's mission to secure over 35 kilometer of alternate supply route (ASR) Golden during Operation GOLD RUSH from 9 to 13 April 2005. Through his superior technical proficiency and leadership, Team Brawler maintained successful communications with the various attached ground combat elements. He supervised the effective employment of not only the organic communication assets, but also of equipment not normally utilized by an armor company, such as the C7/P7 Amphibious Assault Vehicle (AAV), PSC-5 Satellite Communication, and secure mobile anti-jam reliable tactical terminal (SMART-T). His efforts allowed the safe passage of Coalition Force (CF) units through the Regiment's AO.

Staff Sergeant Dalzell was a gun truck commander for Team Brawler during Operations FIRM CONTROL and BAD KHARMA from 8 to 13 May 2005. The combat trains discovered two large weapons caches during a mechanized patrol along a secondary road. Items found included: 425 57-millimeter rockets, 22 68-millimeter rockets, 96 87-millimeter rockets, 19 200millimeter linked rounds, 11 fuses for 2.75 inch rockets, three dummy fuses, 109 rocket motors, one improvised shoulder fired 57-millimeter rocket launcher, and four improvised, ground-fired, 57-millimeter rocket launchers. The second cache was discovered west of the first site and contained over 100 small cans of black powder. Directly underneath those were multiple burlap style bags containing a mixture of powder, thought to be gunpowder and various other unidentified substances. These finds effectively denied the enemy of useful arms and ammunition.

On 16 August 2005, Staff Sergeant Dalzell was leading a mechanized patrol conducting a cordon and knock in the vicinity of Al Ameriyah. During the search of a building west of the city, a Marine of the cordon element engaged a civilian vehicle during an escalation of force encounter, in which three civilians were wounded, one of which was mortally injured with a gunshot wound in the neck. Staff Sergeant Dalzell rapidly assessed the situation, secured the area and directed his corpsman to evaluate and triage the casualties while he reported the situation to higher. After receiving guidance, he transported the civilians to a hospital located within Ferris Town, a city known to be hostile. Although the mortally wounded civilian was deceased, Staff Sergeant Dalzell's commitment to his mission directed him to selflessly lead a patrol to transport the body to local authorities.

Staff Sergeant Dalzell has played a significant role in Company B, 2d Tanks' capacity to bring stability and security throughout the Regiment's Area of Operations. His leadership, supervision, and tactical and technical expertise have helped Company B, 2d Tanks and attached units communicate flawlessly, thus saving the lives of a number of Marines, along with refusing much needed arms caches, manpower, and command and control equipment to the enemy. His actions have directly impacted the Company's combat effectiveness throughout the entire deployment.

MERITORIOUS ACHIEVEMENT AS COMMUNICATIONS CHIEF AND HEADQUARTERS PLATOON SERGEANT, COMPANY B, 2D TANK BATTALION, REGIMENTAL COMBAT TEAM 8, 2D MARINE DIVISION, II MARINE EXPEDITIONARY FORCE (FORWARD) IN SUPPORT OF OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM 03-05 AND 04-06 FROM 13 MARCH TO 1 SEPTEMBER 2005 IN FALLUJAH, IRAQ. STAFF SERGEANT DALZELL LED HIS PLATOON IN OVER 350 COMBAT MISSIONS TO INCLUDE PATROLS, WEAPONS CACHE SWEEPS, VEHICLE CHECK POINTS, AND CORDON AND KNOCK OPERATIONS. IN MAY, DURING OPERATION FIRM CONTROL, HIS PLATOON DISCOVERED A SIGNIFICANT WEAPONS CACHE CONSISTING OF OVER 500 ROCKETS OF VARIOUS CALIBERS. ON 16 AUGUST, HIS ACTIONS FOLLOWING AN ESCALATION OF FORCE INCIDENT LED TO THE TRIAGE AND MEDICAL EVACUATION OF THREE CIVILIAN CASUALTIES. STAFF SERGEANT DALZELL'S INITIATIVE, PERSEVERANCE, AND DEVOTION TO DUTY REFLECTED CREDIT UPON HIMSELF AND UPHELD THE HIGHEST TRADITIONS OF THE MARINE CORPS AND THE UNITED STATES NAVAL SERVICE.
